

Leader of the Pack

An ode to Indy's foremost dogfluencer: Garth the Golden.

NARF A SLICE of Goodfellas sausage-and-steak-stuffed pizza. Cozy up to a cow. Then allow your human to post the salivating and snuggling to Instagram, and wait for the likes to pile up.

likes to pile up.
It's a proven formula for Garth the Golden, a Broad
Ripple Golden retriever who has amassed more than 137,000 followers on Instagram. A video of him meeting his nephew for the first time racked up more than half a million views. Even his toys have their own hashtags. Among this hound's accomplishments: filling an online store with Garth-faced goodies ranging from Cinco de Mayo taco socks

to a calendar, flip-flops, and frosted beer mug; a top-10 finish in the worldwide 2017 *Men's Health* Ultimate Dog Search; and raising more than \$1,000 for Wheeler Mission.

To be honest, it doesn't take much to win Garth's heart: Grab his Lamb Chop plushie (tagged #LambyBae); supply a spoon for him to lick; or cue up his favorite flick, *Homeward Bound* (seriously). Or just show up at the Broad Ripple Farmers Market, where Garth is a mainstay on Saturdays from May through November.

But you need not stroke his oh-sofluffy fur to become a Garth groupie—he has plenty of followers who know him only through his soulful black eyes, soft smile, and wagging tongue. "U DESTROY ME WITH ALL YOUR ADORABLENESS," panted Dana L. Hunter in one of her frequent comments on his Facebook page. "I CAN'T TAKE IT." "The beauty is almost painful," @ nat_1205 swooned beneath an Instagram video of a snoozing Garth using one of his human mom's running shoes as a pillow.

Other than unbridled cuteness, Garth's "mom"-ager, Salesforce account executive Abby Coons, says he doesn't have a secret sauce for social media success (though having a champion showdog dad certainly doesn't hurt). "We keep it real," the Garth Brooks superfan says. "We don't glamorize the posts. We





highlight the happy, funny, frustrating moments, and I think people can relate."

Coons had no aim of making Garth famous when she took him home from Hoosier Heartland Goldens in Frankton, Indiana, in July 2016. She signed him with pet-fluencer magnate The Dog Agency two years ago after the 200 direct messages Garth was getting each day from people and brands looking to collaborate began to get overwhelming. She spends a couple of hours per day managing the account with the help of her husband, Jeremy Coons, a financial advisor.

Her advice for wannabe dog-fluencers? "Don't try to make your dog famous," she says. "Just have fun with it. Use your platform to bring a smile to others."

SIX THINGS YOUR DOG WALKER WISHES YOU KNEW

Hear it from Amira Dutra e Mello, a master dog trainer and behaviorist who founded Fountain Square Dog Training and Walking Services.

OUR DOG COULD be craving a walk right now, even if it's freezing. "Some breeds are better in the heat; some breeds are better in the winter. I take care of four Labradors—they freaking love the winter. Their pads are made for it. During high heat-index days, I'm not going to risk the dogs' pads. If I put my hand down and it burns my hand, I can't walk your dog in that. Maybe someone else would, but I'm not going to be responsible for that."

I don't care what your house looks like. Really. "I've had some clients go, 'You can't come over this week because the house is a mess.' We're there for the dogs. If you have everything out we need, we're in and out. There's no reason for me to be all over the house."

When I tell you I'm walking your dog, I'm walking your dog. "I average 15,000 to 20,000 steps a day Monday through Friday. I've probably lost 25 pounds."

Call me! "People don't realize that our schedules are pretty rigid, and you may need to book as many as three months out. It's actually a real job. It's not Grandma sitting around going, 'Ooh, I'm going to visit a dog today.' I had 11 yesterday. And it could have been more—I had to say no to some people."

My training comes in handy. "One time, a German shepherd came running up to the dog I was walking. We had been working with him a long time on not being dog-reactive. I told him to sit. He did, and I stepped in front of him. The German shepherd was coming in for an attack, hackles raised and ears back. There's a place on their chest you can tap—like a kick, but not a full-on kick—and he stopped. It's scary. Unfortunately, we do have a problem with loose dogs."

There's a reason it's called "tough love."

"Owners project a lot of emotions onto their animals. They want a behavior to change, but they don't want to do the work. They don't want to be the bad guv. You're going to have to say no to your dog, just like you can't raise children with positives only. It's a lack of basic training that gets a lot of dogs dumped." -AS TOLD TO


How to dogproof a yard

Step one: Get a secure, escape-proof fence. If your dog is a jumper, that means something substantially taller than the standard chain-link model. If he's a digger, you'll need something that's flush to the ground. "And you still want to watch to make sure your dog doesn't jump or dig out," says Megan Bousley, a spokeswoman for the Humane Society for Hamilton County.

Another barrier should surround your gardenaccording to the ASPCA, tons of common flowers are dangerous to dogs if ingested. Fertilizers and herbicides are no good. Then there are the coyotes that live in every Indiana county; likewise, red-tailed hawks and bald eagles (which we totally have around here) can pluck pugs, Poms, and other fun-size breeds right out of yards. Which leads to the paramount rule for backyard safety: Pretty much every problem, from horking down mulch to burrowing to freedom to being carried off by our national symbol, can be avoided simply by not leaving your dog outdoors alone for long periods. "Supervision," says Bousley, "is absolutely key." - SAM STALL

A DOG OWNER'S GUIDE TO THE MONON TRAIL





If your dogs are barking in the figurative sense, grab a seat at the southwest corner of Main Street and the Monon, where you can relax while your pup chomps at H2O shooting up from the interactive water feature.



Find seasonal water fountains with built-in dog bowls at Midtown Plaza, 1st Street SW, and the trailheads at 96th Street and Rohrer Road, which also have permanent restrooms. Poop bags running low? Scoop up reinforcements at

low? Scoop up reinforcements at 1st Street NW, 136th Street, and Greyhound Pass.



People- and dog-watching don't get much better than at **Midtown Plaza**, Carmel's hottest gathering spot, with ping-pong tables, cornhole, billiards, and a big-screen TV outside of Sun King Spirits and Fork + Ale House. Both restaurants' al fresco seating areas accommodate canines. Get your pal a Taylor's Bakery treat before taking your can of Pachanga outside.



For a change of scenery, detour off the Monon to explore the pathways that wind throughout Carmel's Central

Carmel's Central Park.

PENDING A DAY on Mass **Ave** doesn't require leaving your dog at home—quite the opposite, actually. Impatient pups might let you browse for only a few minutes at Indy Reads Books before pulling you across the street to City Dogs Grocery, which stocks Delectable Dane fro yo in flavors such as berry and peanut-butter bacon. That

should keep them busy while you sample Napa-made reds and whites at Peace Water Winery, where pets are welcome, inside and out. You'll need your dog's strong sense of smell at Penn & Beech, a pouryour-own-candle spot with more than 100 scents (if only Puppy Breath and Frito Paws were among the options). Sniff out other home accessories and gift items at

Homespun: Modern Handmade, Boomerang Boutique, and Silver in the City, where, if you ask nicely (heck, beg), they might snap a pic for their Dogs of Silver in the City Instagram page. At Pumkinfish, the tinkling bell on the door summons one half of the shop's namesake, 15-year-old Pomeranian Pumkin, who can show you to the dog-friendly chicken broth-based beer and organic wine made from beet juice. If you're ready for treats and drinks of your own, the patios at Mimi Blue, Hedge Row American Bistro, Fat Dan's Deli, World of Beer, Tavern at the Point, and Ralston's **Drafthouse** all accommodate four-legged companions. And if, after all that, your fellow explorer was a good boy or girl, surely they deserve a Puppuccino from the walkup window at **Starbucks** or a carob-dipped "dino bone" treat from the case at Three Dog Bakery. - LAURA KRUTY

its walk-up window.

How to commission a great pet portrait

A handful of local shutterbugs specialize in the uniquely maddening art of getting animals to sit still for pictures. Furtography Studio (2116 E. 54th St, 217-497-4553, indypetphoto graphy.com) offers sessions complete with costumes and props (if your pet tolerates that sort of thing) and presents its finished shots in fine-art canvases or social media-ready digital files. Prices start at \$299. If you'd like something even more rarefied, Indy artist Karen Seltzer, proprietor of **Best in Show Pet Portraits** (bestinshowpetportraits .com), will do a custom oil painting of your pet. Each one takes a few weeks to complete, and they cost from \$138 to just south of a grand. All the work is done from photos, so you don't have to worry about getting your pet to hold still for a sitting.

For a cheap but cute option—say, your dog's head Photoshopped onto the body of an 18th-century noble—find a vendor on Facebook Marketplace or the odd-job service fiverr.com. You might pay as little as you would for a couple cans of Alpo, with a turnaround as short as a few hours. —\$AM \$IALL

Dogs' Best Friend

Meet the Greta Thunberg of local animal advocacy, 17-year-old Sophia Pruitt.

HIS PAST Thanksgiving, Sophia Pruitt, 17, woke up to a call from her boss. Many teenagers might have ignored it and rolled back over, but Sophia answered the call and eagerly took up the offer on the other end, joining Dr. Mary Grabow, a veterinarian at Noah's Animal Hos-

pitals, for an emergency C-section. Sophia witnessed a litter of fuzzy French bulldog puppies born before the day's festivities began.

Sophia is passionate about animals, and has been as long as she can remember. "When I was 2, I was organizing my little animal figurines by habitat," she says. A few years later, she dressed as a Dalmatian and sold homemade dog treats on Lemonade Day. She took the \$70 she earned to the Humane Society of Indianapolis and was offered a tour that jump-started her dedication to animal advocacy. She was 7 then, and has now been volunteering and fundraising for IndyHumane for a decade. She has fostered more than 60 animals, despite her dad's cat allergy, and raised almost \$38,000 to date.

Every achievement she notches just eggs her on to do more. "I think that I stay passionate because of the positive responses that I get from the community," says Sophia. "My family and school are so supportive."

A junior at Brebeuf, Sophia organizes several moneymaking



ventures for IndyHumane, including her birthday-party fundraiser, which she started at age 8: She invited her entire class to the celebration, asking them not to bring gifts, but items to donate to the IndyHumane shelter. Kids brought dog and cat toys, pet beds, treats, and more. The party was such a success, it's become an annual tradition. Sophia also runs Hoops for Hounds, a partnership with the Indiana Fever and Pacers, which she conceived in 2013 while at a Fever game with her family. Her latest project, a Mutt Strut team, is off to an early success: Last year, Sophia and Brebeuf's dog, Chief, earned Mutt Strut's Top Dog award for fundraising, beating out some heavy contenders and raising nearly \$15,000 for the event. This year, the pair will be honored as Grand Marshals for the event, which takes place in April at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Sophia knows all her hours are making a difference at the shelter, saying, "the fact that I am able to see the results of my efforts makes it exciting."

The amount of money Sophia has pulled in is next-level, especially for a teenager, says David Horth, CEO of IndyHumane. "We are very grateful for the money she raises, but we are just grateful to have her," he says. "She's a dynamic and positive and inspirational influence on IndyHumane."

Sophia's service has been recognized over the years, most recently when The Orchard School named her Graduate of the Last Decade for her dedication to animal service. "She was so surprised," says her mother, Elliott Pruitt. "She has a lot of awards and accolades, but she would rather just save another pup or kitten."

How to find a dog through a rescue group

Getting a dog is easy—just visit your local animal shelter. But it's a different story if you want a specific breed. Forget about purchasing one at a pet store, which the Humane Society strongly urges against because they're almost always the sickly products of puppy mills. And buying a pedigreed puppy from a reputable breeder can take months and set you back three or four digits.

There is, however, another way. Breed-specific rescue groups specialize in rehoming everything from Pomeranians to Tibetan mastiffs that have been rejected by their previous owners. They're sprinkled across the state and the nation. Ask your veterinarian, or check the comprehensive list on The American Kennel Club's website.

But first, take time to research the variety you covet. "Not everybody can handle every breed," says Cathy Nolan, president of Giant Paw Prints Rescue, a Valparaiso group that specializes in very large dogs. "You have to be prepared for their personality traits. For instance, German shepherds were originally herding dogs, and will nip at you to make you move."

Breed rescue groups may require everything from a lengthy interview to an in-home visit. They aren't in a hurry, because they want to make sure their charges, most of whom have already lost one home, don't lose another. — SAM STALL

OCCUPATION: Restaurateur and nonprofit founder


DOG: Babe, 2, French bulldog

How to play in the cold


The thing to consider right now is that a dog's ability to cope with the elements depends on its lineage and build. For instance, huskies and other Northern breeds boast thick "double coats" that protect them better than a North Face parka. But short-haired varieties such as pit bulls are wearing what amounts to a light windbreaker.

Assuming your dog won't put up with booties, examine his paws—if the pads are naturally fuzzy, trim them so the hair doesn't cause painful "snowballs" to clump between his toes during walks. If it's snowy out, rinse vour pet's feet with warm water upon returning home. The streets are covered with road salt and other chemicals that can irritate a canine's sensitive pads, and you don't want them licking at that stuff.

And if the occasional hurried walk at freezing temperatures isn't doing it for your dog, consider daycare. She'll wear herself out socializing with other pooches, playing for hours under the watch of pros-a surefire cure for canine cabin fever. - SAM STATE

How to say goodbye to a pet

A wise person once said the only bad thing about dogs is that they don't live long enough—a bitter truth well-understood by anyone who's ever said goodbye to a beloved pet. But it may be comforting to know that when the fateful day finally arrives, several local companies offer the option of home euthanasia. A vet comes to your house, so that your pet can pass on in familiar surroundings, rather than spend his

or her last moments in a sterile exam room.

Typically these firms charge a set fee for the home visit and services, which may be pegged to how far they have to drive to reach the pet in question. Most also offer the additional service (for a price) of immediate removal of the dog's body, along with cremation services. A euthanasia visit from Twilight Services (317-773-8387, wellpetsclinics.com/twilight-services)

usually costs around \$185. Pet Loss At Home (877-219-4811, petlossathome.com), a national network of veterinarians who provide in-home euthanasia, offers its basic services (no body removal) for \$300 to \$450. And Lap of Love (317-975-1950, lapoflove.com) charges \$275. Lap of Love also offers such niceties as the collection of a plaster paw print and locks of hair from your pet. - SAM STALL 🏮
